2. Christian Missions to Northeast India

Serampore Mission

The first missionary efforts to North Eastern Region began with the Serampore mission under the English Baptist Missionary Society. It was William Carey and his Associates who had first contact with an Assamese Pandit Atmaram Sarma of Kaliabar in Nowgong, Assam, in 1811. With his help Carey translated the New Testament in Assamese and released the same in 1819. In 1829 the Serampore mission came to Guwahati and opened a school but it was closed down due to unavoidable reason.

In the meantime, Carey also had a contact with the Khasis in 1813. He sent his helper Krishna Chandra Pal to Pandura (now in Bangladesh), and through his help two Khasis were converted. They were U Dwan and U Anna. The New Testament in Khasi was translated in 1824. The Serampore mission worked for just a short time and closed down.

Again they penetrated Manipur in 1820s. The New Testament in Manipur was translated and printed in 1824; however there is no record of convert.

American Baptist Mission

It was with the help of the British administrators the American Baptist mission came to Sadiya in Upper Assam in 1836. The first missionaries to Sadiya were Nathan Brown and his wife and O.T.Cutter. Their original plan was to reach China, however due to adverse circumstances they had to change their plan.

The second attempt was to reach the Nocte Nagas (now in Arunachal) in 1840; but again failed. From Jaipur they shifted to Sibsagar in 1841, and it was from here they had first contact with the Ao Nagas. It was in 1870s that the first Ao Nagas from Molungkimong (Molung) village met Dr.E.W.Clark and nine of them were converted and got baptized on November 10, 1872 at Sibsagar. The following day they returned to their village and built a chapel and started worship services under Evangelist Godhula. The second batch of fifteen (15) converts was baptized by Clark at Molung on December 22, 1872. And it was on this day the first Naga Church foundation was laid down in Naga soil; later on the American Baptist mission occupied all Naga tribes.

Presbyterian Mission

The Presbyterian mission to the Khasis began in 1841. The first missionaries were Rev and Mrs. Thomas Jones who arrived at Cherrapunji on June 2, 1841. The first converts under their ministry were U Amor and U Rajan who were baptized on March 8, 1846. This is how the Presbyterian mission began which later on spread over to Meghalaya and Mizoram.



Today Northeastern region is predominantly Christians due to very strong impact of missionary waves planting the indigenous churches and local leadership from the very beginning.

3. Introducing United College of Theology & Missions

3.1 History and Vision

On October 15, 1977 the Nagaland Baptist Church Council (NBCC), made a covenant to send ten thousand missionaries to the world. To achieve this vision, United College of Theology and Missions (UCTM) formerly known as Outreach Leadership Training College (OLTC) and Missiological Research Center (MRC) was established to equip men and



women who would faithfully carry out the gospel of Jesus Christ across the great nation of India and its surrounding nations, namely Bhutan, Nepal, China, Bangladesh, and Myanmar and even beyond. Thus UCTM commenced with a four month basic missionary orientation course in 1992 with its motto, 'Discipling Disciplers.' On the demand of the churches, the College introduced Bachelor of Theology (B.Th) in 1996, Master of Arts in Missiology (MA) in 2003 and Master of Divinity (M.Div) in 2007 and Master of Theology in 2021.

Today, UCTM serves as the premier missiological training institute in the whole of North East India. As of now, UCTM has recorded more 700 alumni who serve as pastors, missionaries, church planters, and teachers across Northeast and North India crossing into Nepal, Bhutan, Bangladesh and Myanmar and China.

3.2. Location

Dimapur City is regarded as one of the fastest growing towns in India. It is situated in the foothill area of the southwestern part of Nagaland bordering Karbialong District of Assam.


It is 75 km away from the state capital Kohima. Dimapur has the only Airport in Nagaland and is also well connected with the neighboring states of Manipur, Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Tripura and Mizoram by National Highway No.39. It is, therefore, regarded as the heart of northeast India because of its strategic location and easy access to rest of India and beyond.

The campus is situated by the side of river Jordan (named by UCTM; generally known as Chathe river or Pagla nadi) at the 5th mile of Dimapur to Kohima road, opposite Nagaland Highway Bamboo Resource Center on 39 National Highway. Thus it is located at an ideal place free from pollution and noisy world thereby offering a healthy environment and perfect settlement for meditation and study purposes.

3.3. Doctrinal Statement

God

This fall subjected humans to God's wrath, and brought upon them the eternal death. 3.6. Affiliation and Accreditation

4.1. Application for Admission Procedure

- Christian Commitment Form
- Medical Certificate
- Financial Affidavit dully filled by the applicant or sponsor(s)
- Two Recommendations: the recommender should send the completed UCTM Recommendation Form with his/her signature and seal on the envelop letter.
- Three recent passport photos.
- Self-attested photo copy of all your academic transcripts.
- A written personal statement of Christian experience and a clear sense of call for full-time Christian ministry.
- Spousal Statement/Parents: if applicable, the applicant's spousal/parental consent letter regarding his or her thoughts and feelings regarding your desire to attend UCTM.
- The complete application package can be post-mailed directly to the UCTM Admissions Office or submitted in person. (Or) All the forms in the application (download application) should be submitted in person, duly filled and the documents attached, after your online application form is accepted.

Application will be rejected if there is any discrepancy in the stated documents. Incomplete application will not be considered. At the time of admission, original certificates should be submitted to the office. These shall be returned to the students on completion of the course.

4.2 Admission Requirements

a) Master of Theology (MTh) in Mission

This program is designed to provide specialized training in biblical, theological, contextual and cross-cultural missions, and in doing so seeks to develop transformational and missiological scholar-leaders.

• Eligibility for MTh Programme

A students who holds a bachelor's degree (BA/BTh) and Master of Divinity (MDiv) degree from an approved college/university/seminary may apply for the degree of Master of Theology (MTh) in Mission program.

More specifically,

- i) The candidate should have twelve (12) years of schooling, and have any university degree (BA) or a BTh degree (ATA/SSC).
- ii) The candidate should have passed MDiv degree securing an overall grade with B grade or above.
- iii) The candidate should have completed at least four subjects related to missiology and Church history in their master degree programs.
- iv) The candidate should have earned Greek (3) and Hebrew (3) credits in their earlier degree (MDiv).
- v) Candidates with ministry experience, after their MDiv degree, in a church or mission agencies will be given preference.
- vi) The candidate should write an entrance exam and appear for an oral interview.

Students must earn 36 credits for the degree (27 credits of the course work and 9 credits of thesis). It is designed as a two-year program in which students will take 9 credits per semester and cannot exceed six semester (three years). Greek and Hebrew are a prerequisite and do not count toward the degree. Therefore, for a higher credit load per semester, students must make a formal petition for the approval by the Academic Dean.

b) Master of Divinity

Bachelor graduates from accredited/affiliated colleges who have a minimum of one year practical ministry experience after graduation may be considered for admission to the M.Div program. They will be required to pass entrance tests in English, Bible and General Knowledge. When admitted the candidates will be on academic probation during the first year of study. If the student shows poor academic performance in the first two semesters he or she will be awarded with Post Graduate Diploma in Mission Studies.

c) Master of Arts in Mission

Bachelor graduates from accredited/affiliated colleges who have a minimum of one year practical ministry experience after graduation may be considered for admission to the M.A. in Mission program. They will be required to pass entrance tests in English, Bible and General Knowledge.

d) Bachelor of Theology

Candidates should have successfully completed the pre-university course or its equivalent. Students who are awaiting results may apply. Such candidates will have to produce the grades of the previous course completed. If admitted they should produce completion certificate before the end of the first semester. Special

senate quota for mature candidates who are above 25 years and above having ministerial experience will be eligible for bachelor degree even though they are not XII passed.

e) Diploma in Mission Studies

Candidates should hold High School leaving Certificate or above. A special preference will be given to the candidates with ministerial experience.

f) Certificate in Mission Studies

Candidates should have working English knowledge. A special preference can be given to the candidates with ministerial experience.

g) Basic Missionary Orientation Course

Applicants for Missionary Orientation Course must be matured candidates above 25 years of age with a reasonable proficiency in English language. University graduates, pre-University, High School passed candidates may also apply for this program.

4.3. Orientation of New Students

New students are welcomed to campus by an orientation program designed to help them adjust to UCTM life. Information regarding all aspects of UCTM is provided and ample opportunities to meet other students, faculty, and staff.

5. Academic Policies and Procedures

5.1. Attendance

- a) Students falling below 80% of class attendance shall not be allowed to write exam as per Senate rules.
- b) Students unable to attend the classes must secure written excuse from the Academic Dean.

5.2. Assignments

UCTM considers regular class work/assignments and final examination are paramount in evaluating student's academic performances.

5.3. Semester Exams

- a) There will be every semester exams for all the classes. The time of exam will be in accordance with UCTM calendar of events.
- b) Admit card will be issued on the basis of clearance of fees, especially in the academic year ending. No students will be allowed to enter exam hall without admit card.

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- c) In each subject, the semester exam is of three hours duration, all the examinations are administered through the Academic Dean (except class test) including retake exams.
- d) Any form of unfair means or copying in any test or exams shall be viewed seriously.
- e) Students who fall below the maximum grade of 40% during the first year will be asked to either discontinue or register afresh and repeat the first year.

5.4. Retake Exams

- a) When the student is graded below 40% in any subject, the Academic Dean will permit the student for retake exams.
- b) Retake exams fee will be Rs. 300/- for each subject. The fee should be paid to the accountant one week ahead of the exams.
- c) Two chances will be given to write retake exams for those students who could not make it.
- d) The retake exams cannot be graded higher than C+ or 50-54%.
- e) The retake exams will be conducted as per year calendar of events and not any time as per student's convenience.

5.5. Grading System

Examinations and assignments will be graded in three categories:

First Class- range : 70% and above: within this there are degrees of

achievement,

Distinction : 80% and above. Represented with a letter grade A+

Excellent : 75 -79%. Represented with a letter grade A Superior : 70-74%. Represented with a letter grade A-

Second Class-range : 55-69%:

Good : 65-69% Represented with a letter grade B+ Satisfactory : 60-64% Represented with a letter grade B Barely Satisfactory : 55-59% Represented with a letter grade B-

Third Class- range : 44-54%

Average 50-54% Represented with a letter grade C+

5.6. Overall Assessment

UCTM conducts examinations for 60% and for internal assessment 40% which includes unit test, book reviews, seminar papers, interviews and other learning activities.

5.7. Graduation Requirements

- a) Students must satisfactorily complete all the college requirements including thesis. Thesis should be submitted to Academic Dean Office two weeks before graduation.
- b) Students must clear up all the dues before the graduation. Failure of which, graduation will be refused.



- c) Bachelor level must earn at least 144 credits. Master level for B.Th graduates must earn 98 credits and others 128 credits respectively from all core subjects plus elective subjects to get graduation.
- d) Students who have undergone two months supervised practical field work endorsed by the outreach coordinator.
- e) He/she must demonstrate zeal for lost souls by winning at least two persons during their study period. If not, the student writes a statement confirming his/her sincerity in the ministry.
- f) Students must demonstrate matured moral and spiritual discipline during their training period.

5.8. Thesis Procedure

a) Master of Divinity

Master students who maintained B+ Grade will write thesis. They will be required to submit two topics of their interest which will to be reviewed and evaluated by the Academic Council for approval. Students who are not eligible to write will be required to take three elective courses to the value of 8 credit hrs.

b) Master of Theology in Mission

i) Thesis Registration & Fee

Consentenery is required to register at the beginning of the first semester. No student will be allowed oral defense without their registration. Students are need to follow the guidelines and due dates in order to finish it on time. The dues for their thesis will be informed at the beginning of each semester by the academic coordinator. All thesis- writing candidates are subject to pay a one-time fee of ₹8000 only.

ii) Guidelines for Proposals and Due Dates

Thesis work is required of all the MTh candidates. The thesis is to be submitted to the Academic Dean after the completion of all course requirements. For those who have to return home at earlier time, the research work should be submitted eight weeks prior to graduation, provided the student has completed the required course work. However, such option will be granted only to those who are able to access adequate research resources and supervision from the supervisor. Topics to be researched must be presented to the Head of Department for approval, after which an advisor/supervisor will be appointed for the thesis supervision.

UCTM academic council will assign a supervisor to assist each candidate in thesis writing after the approval of the thesis proposal. Then the candidate will be allowed to officially undertake the thesis work. In order to complete thesis work, the candidate must submit three forms of thesis draft for evaluation and approval by the supervisor, and then take Comprehensive Exam (CE) in addition to final Oral Defense according to the following schedule:

1. Proposal Research Paper : 2nd to 10th week of 2nd Semester

2. 1st Draft
 2nd Draft
 3rd Draft
 4th week of 4th Semester
 3rd Draft
 12th week of 4th semester
 Final Draft
 14th week of 4th semester

6. Comprehensive Exam (CE) : 3rd or 4th Semester after having completed

minimum of 15 major course credits.

After the final approval by the supervisor as the First advisor, and proof reading by the second Advisor, the candidate is entitled to take Oral Exam the 15th week of his/her final semester. The candidate can then officially pass all requirements after the approval by the Academic Council.

The official proposal paper should contain a brief description of the topic, the thesis statement, the significance and relevance of the project, along with a pertinent literature review, research plan, and major bibliography.

This proposal should run about 5-6 pages. Longer is acceptable, but should not contain unnecessary arguments. Shorter means the candidate may need to do more initial research or elaborate his/her plans. Candidates should consult Kate L. Turabian, A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Thesis, and Dissertation: Chicago Style for Students and Researchers (Chicago: University of Chicago, 2013), which would be made available in the UCTM library for the academic formatting of the proposal.

Completion and approval of the preliminary research proposal is a pre-requisite for a candidate who register for the 4th semester. The proposal should contain the following sections:

- 1. Abstract
- 2. Problem/Issue
- 3. Research questions
- 4. Significance and relevance
- 5. Existing explanation and literature review
- 6. Argument
- 7. Method
- 8. Bibliography

The formatting requirement are as follows:

- A4 size paper, 2.54 cm margins, 12 points, Times New Roman font, Double-spaced. Numbered pages
- 2. Project title, student name, and date
- 3. Abstract within 4-5 sentences.

iii) Oral Defense Procedure

A candidate who needs to take the Oral Defense should follow the due dates and deadlines. Those who fail to meet the due dates may be withheld for the Oral Defense. His/her oral defense will be postponed to the next semester. Hence, any candidate should be updated from the academic coordinator beginning of each semester.

5.9. Awards

Each year four students are given special awards in recognition of their meritorious achievements. The awards are:

a) Principal's Award

Is awarded to the student for outstanding accomplishment in Academics and who has the highest grade to date. This award will be decided by the Academic Dean in consultation with the faculty of different departments.

b) D. Haralu's Award

This award is given to the student for demonstrating sincerity; zeal and commitment for the outreach ministry during his/her study period in UCTM. This award will be decided by consensus of UCTM community comprising of faculty and students

c) President's Award

Is awarded to the student for the Best Thesis in terms of creativity and originality in the research for Masters Program. This award will be decided by the Academic Dean in consultation with the faculty of different departments.

d) Student of the Year Award

This award is given to the student who has demonstrated Christian character, zeal for mission and evangelism, shown sincerity in studies and has made contributions by his/her involvement in the community life during his/her study period. This award will be decided by consensus of the whole UCTM community.

6. Facilities

6.1. Library

UCTM library provides the resources and services necessary for the academic and spiritual growth of its students in order to prepare them to be effective pastors, missionaries, mission leaders and teachers in the Lord's service. UCTM



provides quality collection of books and materials dealing with missiology, history of Christianity, theology, bible study, pastoral ministry, effective communication skills and church growth and church planting. It also provides resources necessary for the students' practical efforts in teaching, preaching and evangelism. It enables UCTM to train future leaders in information, research, and study skills, to enable them to continue scholarship throughout their life and ministry.

6.2. Computer

For efficiency and reliability of the college functioning and for academic excellence, the use of computer is essential and for which UCTM provides computers for students research and study purposes.

6.3. Guest House

UCTM provide Guest house to accommodate visiting faculty and oversea or national guest who comes in connection with UCTM purpose. Besides those Christian workers and missionaries who intent to use can be accommodated on payment provided the rooms are available.

7. Campus Life

7.1. Worship and Service

Spiritual life and development is an important feature of the college. A variety of activities are planned to encourage spiritual growth. Chapel programs seek to nurture the spiritual life of students in the context of academic environment. The community is exposed to different experience Christian leaders and pastors. In addition, prayer meetings, chain of prayer, prayer and fasting and family group fellowships help students develop in



their Christian walk. The chaplain of the college oversees the spiritual activities of the community assisted by the worship committee.

7.2. Family Groups

The community is divided into family groups for a year. The purpose of groups is for social interaction, spiritual encouragement and prayer.

7.3. Mentoring Care Groups (MCG)

MCG is a discipleship group mentored by one faculty comprising of few students in each group. MCG meets following the rota prepared by the Chaplain. Mentor may arrange meeting with MCGs whenever required for interations and fellowship.

7.4. Games and Sports

UCTM provides the community with both indoor and outdoor games. Every Thursday 3-4pm is set aside for Games and Sports. The college observes Annual Games and Sports where the whole community participates. The college also organizes friendly matches with outsiders.





7.5. Hostel Life

UCTM is an egalitarian community with committed men and women of God from geographically and culturally diverse backgrounds. We have three dorms for men and three for women, living, sharing and learning together in a cross-cultural environment. All interactions and relationships enrich the community. They have combined vesper service



every evening except thursday for men and women separate fellowship in their respective dorms. Hostel day is observed once in a year which men and women get the opportunity to visit each others' dorms. On this day, students are encouraged for habitual cleanliness, orderliness and creativity both in community and personal levels.

7.6. Campus Upkeeping

The students play a very important part in keeping UCTM campus clean and beautiful. The campus upkeeping incharge organizes social work at least two hours in a week as the need arises. The students are required to have their own working implements.

8. Practical Ministry

Bachelor Level Program Branch I Department of General Studies BG102.3 Discipleship and Spiritual Life Development

BG 104.3 Music

BO 201.3 Old Testament Survey

BO 202.3 Biblical Interpretation

This course is an introduction to the principles and processes of biblical interpretation with emphasis on the principles of general and special hermeneutics

as well as on the basic exegetical methods and tools.

BO 203.3 Introduction to Pentateuch

This study provides a general understanding of the content; message and the formation of the first five books to enable the students understand the authorship and criticism in the study of the Pentateuch.

BO 204.3 History of Israel-A General Study

This course is designed to enable the students understand the history of the people of Israel and to provide significant understanding of God's action in history according to the Old Testament.

BO 205.3 Introduction to Hebrew Poetical and Wisdom Literature

This study provides the students with general information about Hebrew poetry and their value for worship today. It also helps the students to know the relevance of Hebrew wisdom and literature for our times.

BO 206.3 Introduction to Prophetical Movement and Jeremiah

This course is to help the students understand the background and development of prophesy in Israel. Particular attention is given to the development of prophetic ministry in the life of Israel especially in Jeremiah and in the New Testament.

New Testament

BN 301.3 New Testament Survey

This course is designed to introduce New Testament with a view to helping the students to know the background and formation of the New Testament which includes the classification and content of each book of the New Testament that include authorship, date, main themes and purpose.

BN 302.3 Life and Ministry of Jesus Christ

This is a detailed study of the person and work of Jesus Christ with special reference to the present day relevance.

BN 303.3 The Synoptic Gospels- A general study

A comparative study of the synoptic gospels designed to acquaint the students with a comprehensive view of the life of Christ.

BN 304.3 Gospel According to John

This is a detailed study of the gospel of John with special emphasis on the divinity

of Jesus Christ.

BN 305.3 Missiological Issues in Acts and Pauline Epistles

This course introduces the understanding of the church that was established in the first century. It is also a study of the Missiological issues found in the Book of Acts and the Pauline Epistles and the principles of dealing with those issues for today's context.

BN 306.3 Pauline Epistles - A General Study

A general study of the Pauline epistles with particular reference to the theological issues, culture, social, religious, and pastoral issues with the view to developing missionary models and ethical norms for the pastoral ministry in the today's context.

BN 307.3 Pastoral Epistles - A General Study

This course introduces the theological and the pastoral issues of the epistles with the view to enabling the students to grapple with the missiological issues in today's context.

BN 308.3 The General Epistles- A General Study

A study of the General Epistles that includes the authorship, date, purpose, occasion and general background of each of the epistles. This study also deals with the general characteristics and the problems of the church reflected in them and their solutions.

BN 310.3 The Book of Revelation

This exposition of the Book of Revelation demonstrates that Revelation does not merely tell the events of the end times. Rather it tells there events in such a day as to help the rather live a godly life and be an overcomer.

BN 311.3 Preliminary Greek

This study is an introduction to Biblical Greek dealing with the elements of vocabulary, morphology and grammar. A workable knowledge of the language is developed that is sufficient to begin exegetical work in the New Testament studies.

Branch VI Department of Theology

BT 401.3 Introduction to Systematic Theology I

This course deals with major doctrines like the revelation of God, the Scripture and the Triune God. This course is designed with a view to enabling the students

grow deeper in Christian faith and commitment.

BT 402.3 Introduction to Systematic Theology II

This course deals with major doctrines like the origin of man and sin, salvation, the church, eschatology and the doctrine of Satan and Angels. This course is designed with a view to enabling the students grow deeper in Christian faith and commitment.

BT 403.3 Christian Ethics

This study is an introduction to Christian Ethics, with attention given to methodology, biblical foundations and Christian responsibility in relation to the personal and current social issues.

Branch V Department of History of Christianity BH 501.3 History of Christianity – World

The course covers overall view of the history of the Christianity from a missiological perspective. It is to help students learn lessons from the past of how God's people in trying to fulfill God's Great Commission have failed and succeeded in their endeavor.

BH 502.3 History of Christianity - India

The course covers the History of Christianity in India from the first century to the present day within the scope of missiological implications and lessons for today.

Branch VI Department of Missiology

BM 601.3 Missionary Anthropology

The course studies the theories and methods of anthropology in studying human societies and cultures, and applies these insights in planting churches and developing contextualized expressions of Christianity.

BM 602.3 Evangelism

This course provides a comprehensive and practical introduction to biblical teaching of evangelism, practice of evangelism, particularly in and through the local church. It is designed to enable the learners to build an evangelistic mindset and ministry in the church.

BM 603.3 Life and Work of Cross Culture Missionary

This course is designed to enable the learners to understand the importance of Spiritual calling to do a work of a missionary. Emphasis is given in this course to

prepare the leaners concerning the expectation and challenges in the mission field.

BM 604.3 Strategies of Church Planting

This course is to acquaint the students with the biblical principles and practices of church planting and growth based on the Bible. Key attention is given to historical models, cultural issues involved.

BM 605.3 Theology of Mission

This course is designed to equip the students with the concepts, its origin, purpose, scope, goal and development of theology of mission. It concerns with the missiological approach in the study of the Bible to be challenged for ministry.

BM 606.3 Contemporary Issues in Mission

This course outlines the various issues in mission to acquaint the students with various emerging issues confronting Christian mission today and to effectively deal with them from the Biblical perspective.

BH 607.3 Missionary Biographies - Selected

This is a study of the lives of great men and women in the history of missions to motivate the students to take up such challenges and make commitment in life for missions.

Branch VII Department of Christian Ministry BCM 701.3 Pastoral Care and Counseling

This course is an introduction to the study of pastoral care and counseling, the principles and skills of counseling, and dealing with the various practical situations to equip the students for competent pastoral ministry.

BCM 702.3 Church Management

This course emphasizes on the nature, function and organizational structures of the church including the business and financial affairs of the church. It is designed to equip the students with the principles and procedures involved in mission and church management

BCM 703.3 Homiletics

MAM 602. 3. Cross Cultural Communication

This course is to help the students learn the definition of culture, form and meaning and the basic approaches and principles for effective cross cultural communication.

MAM 603. 3. Strategies of Church Planting

This course is to acquaint the students with the Biblical principles and practices of church planting and growth based on the Bible. Key attention is given to historical models and cultural issues involved in church planting and growth.

MAM 604. 3. Urban Mission

This course is an introduction to theories and practices of urban ministries. It is designed to enable the students identify, understand and appreciate the enormous urban challenges for the ministry. Key biblical and theological reflections on the city are undertaken with a view to assisting the students to grasp the importance of doing effective ministry in urban context.

MAM 605. 3. Theology of Mission

MAM 606.3. Contemporary Issues in Mission

Branch III Department of Theology

MT 401. 3. Systematic Theology I

MT 402.3 Systematic Theology II

MT 403.3. Christian Apologetics

This course also expounds how Christians have defended the faith throughout the history of the Christianity. The course will make the learner learn the principles of proper apologetics and develop skills to use the Bible in apologetics.

MT 404.3 Person And Work Of Jesus Christ

The course introduces the students to doctrinal development on the person and the works of Christ in the light of the socio-political and religio-philosophical issues of the time. It covers the New Testament presentation of the person and the work of Christ. The course also covers the major Christological teaching of the early church as well as the present Indian Christian theologians.

MT 405.3 Pauline Theology

Pauline theology is so designed for the students to comprehend a supernatural power that brought change and difference to a person resulting in a new worldview of himself, God, and his vision. A major focus is given on identification of outstanding and pertaining thoughts of Paul that have relevant impact and application for churches today.

MT 406. 3. Asian Christian Theology with Special Emphasis on India

This course is designed to help the students understand the different Asian context and help them formulate their own theological stance and relevance.

MT 407. 3. Contemporary Theology

This course is an examination of contemporary views and trends in the theological world and an attempt to evaluate those themes in the light of Biblical theology of church and mission.

MT 408.3. Biblical Theology

This course is an overview of the covenantal structure of the whole of Biblical revelation. The connection between the Old and New Testaments will be studied with a goal of giving an account of the elements of continuity and discontinuity. Emphasis is given on the Bible as a unified story of God's purposes for the people of the world as they reach their fulfillment in Christ

MT. 409.3. Christian Ethics

This course is an introduction to Christian Ethics with attention given to history of Christian ethics, methodology, Biblical foundations, types of Christian thought, and Christian responsibility in relation to the personal and current social issues.

Branch IV Department of History of Christianity MH 501. 3. History of Mission – World

This course is designed to help the students to learn how Christian missions came to North East India. The coming of the Christian missions to the mainland India beginning from the 1st century AD did not touch these regions up until the beginning of the 18th century. Thus Indian church/mission history gives no place or very little information on the missionary activities in North east in their treatment even today.

Branch V Department of Mission

MM 601. 3. Cultural Anthropology

Anthropology, culture subsystems of culture and worldview along with the change of culture worldview with aim to prepare students for intercultural ministry.

MM 602. 3. Cross Cultural Communication

This course is to help the students learn the definition of culture, form and meaning and the basic approaches and principles for effective cross cultural communication.

MM 603. 3. Strategies of Church Planting

This course is to acquaint the students with the Biblical principles and practices of church planting and growth based on the Bible. Key attention is given to historical models and cultural issues involved in church planting and growth.

MM 604. 3. Urban Mission

This course is an introduction to theories and practices of urban ministries. It is designed to enable the students identify, understand and appreciate the enormous urban challenges for the ministry. Key biblical and theological reflections on the city are undertaken with a view to assisting the students to grasp the importance of doing effective ministry in urban context.

MM 605. 3. Theology of Mission

This course is designed to equip the students with the concepts, origin of mission, motives, message, methods, strategy and purpose and goals of the Christian world missions primarily based on the Bible and modern development.

MM 606.3. Contemporary Issues in Mission

This course outlines the various issues in mission with a view to acquainting the students with various emerging issues confronting Christian mission today and to effectively deal with them from the Biblical perspective.

MM 607.3 Mission And Evangelism

This course deals with the entire development of Christian mission and evangelism relate to South Asian context. Priorities were set to understand biblical foundations of mission and evangelism drawn Bible. It will discuses few related historical phenomena of the Christian mission in India, draw out theological and missiological concerns, motifs, implications for discussion and conclude with a discussion on the practice of evangelism.

MM 608. 2. Holistic Mission

This course is the study of mission from a holistic perspective. It examines various models of missions with a view to constructing a holistic concept of mission based on the Bible. Particular attention is given to the study of contextualization to develop relevant and meaningful expression of Christianity to a given situation and context.

MH 609.3. Missionary Biographies - Selected

This is a study of the lives of great men and women in the history of missions to motivate the students to take up such challenges and make commitment in life for missions.

Branch VI Department of Christian Ministry

MCM 701.3. Church Ministry Part I

A study of the foundation of Church ministry with emphasis given to Biblical foundation of ministry, the role of preaching and worship in Church ministry, church organization and administration. The various levels of leadership in the church will be considered.

MCM 702.3. Church Ministry Part II

This study is designed to draw out the importance of Church ministry with an emphasis to Christian education. The historical development of Christian education, agencies of Christian education, developmental needs, learning processes, methods and aids in teaching and the church role in Christian education will be emphasized. It is also designed to enable the learners to recognize their privileges and responsibilities as believers.

MCM 703.3. Pastoral Care and Counseling

This course is a study of the theological foundations of pastoral care and counseling, theories and methods, principles and skills of counseling, and dealing with the various practical situations and in designed to enable the students.

MCM 704.3. Mission and Church Management

The emphases of this course are on the nature, function and organizational structures of the church including the business and financial affairs of the church. It is designed to help the students understand the principles and procedures involved in mission and church management.

MCM 705.3. Homiletics

This course deals with the skills, art and theory of preaching. It is designed to equip the students to effectively present the Word of God primarily to the congregation for positive response.

MCM 706.3. Introduction to Communication Studies

This course deals with Christian Communication and its skills. It emphasizes the role of communication in the ministry and mission of the churches as well as the theological formation of the students. This course also aims at bringing out the various aspects of Christian Communication challenging the communication technology and media studies.

MCM 707.3. Women in Ministry

This course is designed to acquaint students concerning gender issues today. definitions and construction of women from historical perspective will be examined.

This study will also address sexuality, gender issues and media, equality and responsibility within relationships, families, church and society. Particular emphasis will be on the equal participation of both women and men in all the ministries of the gospel.

Branch VII Department of Religion and Philosophy

MR 801.3. Major World Religions

It is a general introduction to the study of the religions with a view to enabling the students to understand the origin, the main teachings and the scope of each religion in world and to be able to compare with the claims of Christianity.

MR 802.3. Modern Religious and Secular Movements in India

This course is a general introduction in the study of modern religious and secular movements in India to acquaint the students with the major religious and socio political developments in the sub-continent during the 19th and 20th centuries. The study includes a critical evaluation of these movements so that the students will understand the positive and negative impact and the church's witness in contemporary secular India.

MR 803.3. Cults and Occults

This course will study the major cults and occults and seek to develop a critical understanding which will enable the students to effectively deal with its beliefs and practices by the standard of the Bible.

MR 804.3. Survey of Indian Philosophy

This course introduces to students the philosophy as a discipline, focusing primarily on the philosophical systems of India.

Basic Missionary Orientation Course

BMO 901.3. Strategies of Church Growth

This course is to acquaint the students with the Biblical principles and practices of church planting and growth based on the Bible. Key attention is given to historical models, cultural issues involved in church planting and growth.

BMO 902.3. Missionary Anthropology

This course examines the theories and methods anthropology uses in studying human societies and cultures, and applies these insights in the planting of churches and developing contextualized expressions of Christianity.

BMO 903.3. Urban Missions

This course is an introduction to theories and practices of urban ministries. It is designed to enable the students to identify, understand and appreciate the enormous

urban challenges for the ministry. Key biblical and theological reflections on the city are undertaken with a view to assisting the students to grasp the importance of doing effective ministry in urban context.

BMO 904.3. Cross Cultural Communication

This course is to help the students learn the definition of culture, form and meaning and the basic approaches and principles for effective cross cultural communication.

BMO 905.3. History of Mission - India

This study covers the History of Christianity in India from the first century to the present day within the scope of missiological implication and lessons for today.

BMO 906.3. Missionary Biographies - Selected

This is a study of the lives of great men and women in the history of missions to motivate the students to take up such challenges and make commitment in life for missions.

BMO 907.3. Pastoral Care and Counseling

This course is a study of the theological foundations of pastoral care and counseling, theories and methods, principles and skills of counseling, and dealing with the various practical situations.

BMO 908.3. Leadership Skills

This course is an introduction to the study of pastoral care and counseling, the principles and skills of counseling, and dealing with the various practical situations to equip the students for competent pastoral ministry.

BMO 909.3 First Corinthians

It is a detailed study of Corinthians with emphasis given on the nature of the problems in the church, solution and its relevance to the present day church.

Master of Theology in Mission

There are two divisions—major courses and non-major courses. All courses shall be offered in module system.

MRM 701.3. Biblical Theology of Mission

This course is the study of mission history as revealed in the Bible from Genesis to Revelation. The course will help the student to lean how the Bible unfolds God's progressive plan for the redemption of the whole world and thereby obtain an overall understanding of church's participation in the mission of God. Students will be given the opportunity to examine the entire Bible tracing what God actually says and does



about mission in a search for a truly biblical theology of mission that is grounded in the revelation of God, and that is understandable for contemporary context. The course provides the students with various perspectives and teachings of God's mission in the Bible to enable the students to stand firm for the revealed truth, and commit themselves to fulfil the mission of the triune God.

MGC 702.3. Gospel and Culture

This course will explore the interaction between the gospel, church and culture, and what this means for transmission of the gospel in both Indian and global context today. A particular focus will be given on contemporary culture and its relationship to Christian faith that will give guidance, support, and depth to Christian ministry. The course will also help the students familiarize with sources of cultural understanding including film, music, and television, and examines and evaluates innovative approaches to ministry that seek to respond effectively to contemporary culture.

MLC 707.3. Leadership Challenges in Church and Mission

It is designed to build up leadership qualities and competency of the students and to give them a familiarity with the various elements of the administrative process, goal setting and achieving, organization, delegation, human relations, group dynamics, supervision, and training of other leaders. Classes will involve readings, discussions, problem solving, and scenario assignments.

MCM 704.3. Contemporary Trends and Issues in Missions

The course is prepared to introduce the current trends and issues in missions. We will look into different areas like political, economic, social, and spiritual changes in the world that will have profound effect on the church and on world missions. Students will be able to analyze the difficulties, dangers and problems the mission is facing today and will also see that the next twenty-five years unprecedented change in the world mission of the christian church. We will also follow closely A. McGavran, Crucial Issues in Mission Tomorrow, and Lalrinawma, Missiological Issues Facing the Contemporary Church in India, David Bosch, Transforming Mission: A Paradigm Shift in Theology of Mission, and Andrew Walls articles as well. These selected scholars have contributed vast array of bibliography for each section and that is a major contribution to missiological study.

MCC 707.3. Cross Cultural Communication

The course is designed as cross-cultural communication to equip the learners to indigenously, natively, and effectively communicate the message to different cultures in their languages, and reach different human ages, professions, social status and generation levels in their relevance.

MHC 705.3. History of Mission: India

This study deals with the entire development of Christian Mission in Indian context. It will discuss few related historical phenomena of the Christian Mission in India with special emphasis to Serampore Mission, draw out theological and missiological concerns, motifs, implications for discussion and conclude with a discussion on the practice of evangelism.

MCG 709.3. An Analysis of Church Growth and Planting

The course is designed to investigate the health condition of a church with a view to healing or recovering from declination, to strengthen a healthy church for enhancing—qualitatively increase and multiply—and planting biblical, evangelical churches in cross-cultural mission. Strategies are recommended to advance the movement of church growth and planting. It includes salient features of scientific aspect of understanding of church growth.

MNT 711.3. Missiological Issues in Acts and Pauline Epistles

This course introduces the trainees to missiological issues in the Book of Acts of the Apostles and all the letters of Paul and provides them an understanding of how the early churches encountered various missiological issues and fulfilled the great commission of Jesus Christ.

MRM 710.3. Research Methodology

This course is designed to help students understand the basic study methods for improving their skills in reading, writing processes, and also to assist the students learn how to make secondary research and report the findings. Attention will be given to techniques of data collection, reading, analyzing, documenting and fine-tuning the academic writing. This course also enables the student to acquaint with the library resources and to be familiar with the style and format of academic writing and reporting.

MAT 712.3. Asian Christian Theology and Hermeneutics

The course seeks to emphasize on the Indian and Asian Christian theology and its religious, economic, and cultural context with an objective to understand the issues facing in India and Asia and ultimately develop a contextual theology.

MOT 706.3. Old Testament Theology

This course is designed to study and understand the formation and development of the Old Testament theology from the historical perspective. It surveys the history, methodology, and issues related to the Old Testament Theology.
